The context of trials

Benefiting from trials, rather than blaming God for our failure in trials Let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath (1:19–20)

Let every man be swift to hear (1:21–2:26)

Being hearers who do (1:21–27)

Not holding our faith with an attitude of partiality (2:1–13)

Deliverance through applying what we believe (2:14–26)

Let every man be slow to speak (3:1–18)

Let every man be slow to speak (4:1–5:6)

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- 3:1 Believers should not rush to teach, because teachers face a stricter judgment at Bema
- 3:2 All believers (including James) stumble in various ways, so the believer who can prevent self from stumbling in words, is mature enough to prevent stumbling in other areas of life
- 3:3 By analogy, a handler who controls a horse's mouth through a bridle and bit also controls the entire body of the horse
- 3:4 Similarly, though the rudder is far smaller than sails, it enables the pilot to direct a ship

What do we say in light of verse 8 about James' view of the Christian life?
3:10–12 The same mouth both blesses and curses, which is entirely inappropriate for believers, just as (in nature) springs do not produce both bitter and sweet water; figs do not produce olives; grapevines do not produce figs; springs do not produce both salt water and fresh
3:9 Tongue's unruliness is clear, because it blesses the Creator, but curses those created in His image
3:7–8 Though man really has sovereignty over all beasts, the evil & poisonous tongue excepted
3:6a In our course of life the tongue can inflame anything
3:6b Tongue defiles the whole body & sets on fire all that our lives touch, but Gehenna sets it on fire
3:5b-6a The kindles (as it were) huge forest fires, the (embodiment) of evil
3:5a Similarly, the little tongue is a great boaster

How were some of James' readers trying to display their wisdom?

How slow should one be to speak? (Remember 1:19: the outline statement)

3:14–16 Bitter envy & self-centeredness (1) demonstrate that one's wisdom did not come from God (but is worldly and demonic) and (2) produce confusion and all manner of evil

3:17 Godly wisdom is pure, peaceable, gentle, yielding, full of mercy and good fruits, not partial, and not hypocritical

Pure

Peaceable,

Gentle cf. 1:27 and 2:13

Yielding

Full of mercy cf. 2:13b

Full of good fruits cf. 1:22–25; 2:14–26

Not partial cf. 2:1–13

Not hypocritical cf. 3:14
